
THINKING ABOUT JESUS FILMS*

Why?




Bible Thoughts

How are the Biblical gospels being used to shape the story? Are the four gospels combined into a single story is just one gospel being used? Is the biblical material being reinterpreted into a contemporary context?



Historical Thoughts

How does the film address the historical details about Jesus, Judea and Galilee, the Romans, the Jewish leaders, and the lives of everyday people? What sources are used to provide the historical background?



Theology Thoughts

What is the film's message about Jesus? Does it portray Jesus as fully God and fully human? How does the film interpret Jesus' teaching and ministry? Does the film include Jesus' death and resurrection? How does it explain those?
